## Addendum to the Specification of the CIP3"'

## Print Production Format

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The CIP3 Print Production Format was specified by the Fraunhofer Institute for Computer Graphics in close collaboration with a group of about 40 well-known manufacturers. This group was called "International Cooperation for Integration of Prepress, Press, and Postpress" (abbreviated as CIP3).

The Print Production Format is now implemented by many of the member companies in systems that are working today in hundreds of printing companies around the world. The success of PPF has created demands in two areas. On one side there is the demand for including further technical information into the format (e.g. for web printing). On the other side there is the demand that the production process control should be integrated with information management systems in printing companies.

In particular for the latter reason, CIP3 has decided to widen its scope of activity and to reorganize its structure to provide the appropriate infrastructure. As a result of this reorganization, the group is now called "International Cooperation for Integration of Processes in Prepress, Press, and Postpress" (abbreviated as CIP4).

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## 1 Overview

This document is an addendum to version 3.0 of the Specification of the CIP3 Print Production Format, which was published on June 2, 1998. The addendum does not specify a new version of CIP3 PPF. Instead, its goal is to explain how to work with the current specification. Nevertheless, a few definitions (attributes and postpress operations) are added to the specification by this addendum.

Chapter 2 explains the coordinate systems as they are defined in CIP3 PPF Version 3.0. In addition it shows how the transformation matrices are used to transform coordinates from one coordinate system to another.

Chapter 3 describes some extensions to CIP3 PPF for web printing applications. Most of the definitions given here do not specify new CIP3 PPF objects, but instead explain and define how the objects already defined in CIP3 PFP version 3.0 can be used for web printing applications. Nevertheless, a few new items have to be defined, like the Dividing and Gluing operations.

Chapter 4 explains how to create CIP3 PPF files in a scenario where multiple plates are mounted to one press cylinder. In order to be able to store the information about which plate is mounted where, two new attributes are defined.

In chapter 5, five new attributes (including the two of chapter 4) are introduced, which are added to the CIP3 PPF Specification. Since they all are optional, compatibility with "standard" CIP3 PPF Version 3.0 files is not affected.

Chapter 6 presents some implementation guidelines which are intended as clarifications of some issues arising from the CIP3 Print Production Format (PPF) specification.

Finally, in chapter 7 a list of known errors of the CIP3 PPF Specification Version 3.0 is given together with the corresponding corrections.

## 2 Coordinate Systems and Transformations

This chapter explains the coordinate systems as they are defined in CIP3 PPF Version 3.0. In addition it shows how the transformation matrices are used to transform coordinates from one coordiante system to another coordinate system.

### 2.1 Introduction

In prepress the coordinates of many objects (e.g. register marks or cut marks) are stored within a CIP3 PPF file by using the PostScript coordinate system. At later production stages these objects appear on different media (e.g. on film, plate, or paper) each having its own dimensions and its own coordinate system. It is therefore necessary to transform coordinates between the different coordinate systems, which in turn requires the specification of the relation between them. This relation is specified by a transformation matrix.
A convenient way to calculate coordinate transformations in a two-dimensional space is by using so-called homogeneous coordinates. With this concept, a coordinate $\mathrm{P}=(\mathrm{x}, \mathrm{y})$ is expressed in vector form as $\left[\begin{array}{lll}x & y & 1\end{array}\right]$. The third element " 1 " is added to allow the vector being multiplied with a transformation matrix describing scaling, rotation, and translation in one shot. Although this only requires a $2^{*} 3$ matrix (as it is used in PostScript for example), in practice $3^{*} 3$ matrices are much more common, because the can be concatenated very easily. Thus, the third column is set to " 00 1 ".

## Example 2-2: Transforming a point

In this example, the position P1 given in the film coordinate system is transformed to a position of the plate coordinate system. The relation between the two coordinate systems is given by the transformation matrix Trf Plate .

### 2.2 Surface-based Coordinate Systems

Each of the coordinate systems used in CIP3 PPF is - with one exception (the PostScript coordinate system) - strongly bound to a physical object.

The origin of the PostScript coordinate system is located in the lower left

The origin of the film coordinate system is defined by the lower left corner of the film. The unit is $1 / 72$ inches in both directions. The extent is defined by the dimensions of the film.

The relation between the film coordinate system and the plate coordinate system is defined by the offset between the two origins.

The origin of the plate coordinate system is defined by the lower left corner of the plate. The unit is $1 / 72$ inches in both directions. The extent is defined by the dimensions of the plate.

The relation between the plate coordinate system and the press coordinate system is defined by the offset between the two origins.

The press coordinate system is defined by the maximum print area of the press. The origin is located in the lower left corner. The unit is $1 / 72$ inches in both directions. Start of print is at the bottom, while end of print is at the top.

The relation between the press coordinate system and the paper coordinate system is defined by the offset between the two origins.

The origin of the paper coordinate system is defined by the lower left corner of

## Paper

 corner. The unit is $1 / 72$ inches in both directions. The extent is defined by the dimensions of the job.This coordinate system is used in prepress for specifying the position of register marks, color measuring fields, and color control strips. In addition it is also the exact area covered by the preview images.

The relation between the PostScript coordinate system and the film coordinate system is defined by the offset between the two origins.

the paper. The unit is $1 / 72$ inches in both directions. The extent is defined by the dimensions of the paper.

The following steps are necessary to transform a coordinate (e.g. the position of a color measuring field) from the PostScript coordinate system to the paper coordinate system:

- clip coordinate at PS extent (i.e. check if coordinate is inside the extent)
- transform coordinate to film coordinate system
- clip coordinate at film extent
- transform coordinate to plate coordinate system
- clip coordinate at plate extent
- transform coordinate to press coordinate system
- clip coordinate at press extent
- transform coordinate to paper coordinate system
- clip coordinate at paper coordinate system

If a number of coordinates have to be transformed by the same sequence of transformations, it is useful to calculate the combined transformation matrix by concatenating the elementary transformation matrices. If clipping is important, a combined clipping region can be calculated (which may not be rectangular).

### 2.3 Block-based Coordinate Systems

Within CIP3 PPF it is possible to define a hierarchy of nested cut blocks (see chapter 3.9 "Cutting Data" of CIP3 PPF Specification Version 3.0). The position and orientation of a cut block is specified relative to the parent block by the CIP3BlockTrf attribute. If the cut block is the root of the hierarchy of cut blocks, the position and orientation is specified relative to the PostScript coordinate system.
The transformation matrix specified by the CIP3BlockTrf attribute can directly be used to transform a coordinate of the cut block into the coordinate system of the parent block (or the PostScript coordinate system, if the cut block is the root of the cut block hierarchy):

### 2.4 Relation Between Coordinate Systems of Different Surfaces or Print Runs

For one sheet, there can be two chains of coordinate systems: one for the front surface and one for the back surface. The two chains meet at the paper coordinate system. Of course, both paper extents must be exactly the same.


Illustration 2-2: Coordinate systems
The arrows indicate how the transformation between the two coordinate systems is defined. If a transformation in the opposite direction is required, the invers matrix has to be calculated.
The relation between the two paper coordinate systems is given implicitly by the (newly defined) CIP3AdmWorkStyle attribute (see chapter 5 "New Attributes" on page 64 for the definition of this attribute). The attribute can have one of the following values: /Simplex, /WorkAndBack, /Perfecting, /WorkAndTurn, /WorkAndTumble, and /WorkAndTwist.

## Work Style: Simplex

Only one side of the sheet (or web) is printed. There is one press run only.

## Work Styles: WorkAndBack, Perfecting, WorkAndTurn, and WorkAndTumble

When printing on both surfaces of a sheet (or web), it is often necessary to transform coordinates of one surface to a coordinate system on the other surface. This can be done by using the transformation matrix specified in column 6 of Table 2-1: "Work Styles" on page 11. The matrix defines the transformation from the paper coordinate system of the front surface to the paper coordinate system of the back surface. Since all of the matrices specified in this table are "symmetric matrices", they can also be used to perform the transformation in the other direction (i.e. from the back surface to the front surface).

## Work Style: WorkAndTwist

When printing on the same surface of a sheet in two print runs, it is also often necessary to transform coordinates between coordinate systems of the different print runs. This can be done by using the transformation matrix given in the last row of table 2-1 in the same way as described above.

### 2.5 Coordinate System Used for Folding

Folding can be specified in two places within a CIP3 PPF file. The folding of sheets is specified in the FoldProcedures section (see chapter 3.10 "Folding Data" of the CIP3 PPF specification version 3.0), while the folding of partial products is specified in the Product Definition section (see chapter 3.3.2.11 "Folding" of the CIP3 PPF specification version 3.0). The following illustration explains how the coordinate system is changed with the execution of each step of a folding procedure.

### 2.6 Coordinate Systems Used in the Product Definition Section

The table shown below is a corrected and improved version of table 3-9 of CIP3 PFP Specification Version 3.0 (page 31). It shows examples of often used matrices. Each two matrices shown in a row are inverse to each other. It is important to know that $\boldsymbol{w}$ and $\boldsymbol{h}$ are the width and the height of the object in the source coordinate system.

In this example, the position of the cut mark $A$ is given in the coordinate system of Block 3. Let's call this position $A_{\text {Block3 }}$. Since Block 3 is directly nested within the Left Block, the position $A_{\text {Block3 }}$ can be transformed into a position within the coordinate system of the Left Block. This position can then be called $A_{\text {LeftBlock }}$. The transformation is performed by multiplying position $A_{\text {Block } 3}$ with the block transformation of Block 3 as specified by the CIP3BlockTrf attribute within Block 3:

## 3 Web Printing Extensions

This chapter describes some extensions to CIP3 PPF for web printing applications. Most of the definitions given here do not specify new CIP3 PPF objects, but instead explain and define how the objects already defined in CIP3 PFP version 3.0 can be used for web printing applications. Nevertheless, a few new itemsare added, like the Dividing and Gluing operations.

### 3.1 Specification

The changes can be categorized as follows:

- Explanation. Provides a better explanation of an aspect of the current CIP3 PPF specification Version 3.0. It does not explicitly imply any changes to the syntax or semantics of CIP3 PPF. Therefore it can also be applied to CIP3 PPF Version 3.0.
- Web printing requirement. Specifies an additional requirement (e.g. for attributes), which is only valid for web printing applications.
- New operation. Defines a new operation in the Product Definition section.
- New definition. A new attribute is defined in the Product Definition section.


### 3.1.1 Explanations

The following illustration shows the press coordinate system used for web printing.


## Illustration 3-1: Coordinate system used for web printing

Each web of a web printing job is described within CIP3 PPF as one sheet. Jobs using multiple webs must be described with a CIP3 PPF file containing multiple sheets.

- Folding in the former is described by the Folding operation in the Product Definition section.
- Slitting and cross cutting are both described by the Dividing operation in the Product Definition section. This is a new operation.
- Gathering of ribbons is described by the Gathering operation in the Product Definition section.
- Gluing of ribbons is described by the Gluing operation in the Product Definition section. This is a new operation.


### 3.1.2 Web Printing Requirements

In a CIP3 PFP file created for web printing, the following CIP3 attributes must be defined (although they are marked as optional in the CIP3 PPF Specification).

### 3.1.3 New Operations

Two new operations are defined: Dividing and Gluing.

### 3.1.3.1 Dividing

This operation describes the dividing process. The operation type, which is specified by the CIP3ProductOperation attribute, must be set to /Dividing.

The operation requires one input component, the web, sheets, or signatures to be divided.
The operation can have multiple output components, called subproducts. A subproduct can be referenced by defining a component definition dictionary with the following entries:

- /SourceType /SubProduct
- SourceProduct (name of corresponding partial product)
- /SourceSubProduct (name of subproduct)

The operation requires one component, the sheet or signature to be glued.

### 3.1.4 New Definitions

### 3.1.4.1 Encoding of Product Definition Hierarchy

The product definition hierarchy is used to describe a set of related products (e.g. different issues or editions of a newspaper). It is stored in the CIP3ProductHierarchy attribute of the Product Definition section.

There are four predefined hierarchy levels:

- Title The title is the general name of a publication. It is the highest level of the product definition hierarchy.
Examples: "New York Times", "Le Monde", "Frankfurter Allgemeine".
- Issue The issue is a variation of a title, specific to a particular date or time. Example: "the New York Times from Wednesday, January 26, 2000".
- Edition The edition is a variation of a title or an issue, specific to a particular geographical delivery area.
Example: "New York Times, East Coast Edition".
- Edition Version The Edition Version is a variation of an Edition. An Edition Version may differ from others in price, language, ads, local geographical area etc. There can be several nested hierarchy levels of Edition Versions.
Example: A "Zone" is an Edition Version which is specific to a local delivery area.

The nesting of hierarchy levels is restricted by the following rules:

- A Title node may only contain a set of Issue nodes or a set of Edition nodes (or nothing).
- An Issue node may only contain a set of Edition nodes (or nothing).
- An Edition node may only contain a set of Edition Version nodes (or nothing).
- An Edition Version node may only contain a set of Edition Version nodes (or nothing).

### 3.3 Glossary

Corresponds to CIP3FinalProducts <br> which is an attribute defined in version 3.0 of the CIP3 PPF specifica- <br> tion. |

### 3.3.2 Press Terms

Press Run

Form The identifier assigned to describe the sum of the signatures (of one press run). A form may contain one or more signatures.

The result of collecting and/or cutting and/or folding one or more ribbons printed in a single press run coming out of one press delivery. One or more ribbons from one or more webs can go into one signature.
Results from the operations performed (slitting, gathering, folding). If

| Physical Section | A folded part that is easily separated from the product. A physical section consists of one or more four-page sheets which have a common spine fold. A section can also contain a two-page sheet. |

| Ribbon Order | The order of the ribbons going into the same former. The ribbons are numbered from inside to outside where the inside ribbon is the one in direct contact with the former. Will be described by the Gathering operation in PPF. |
| Salvage Trim | The paper trimmed from one or both edges of the web(s). This process is used to make the width of the web(s) available match the optimum width required to produce the signature(s) with the correct dimensions. |

### 3.3.3 Postpress Terms

The postpress job is not specific to web printing. The signature is the interface between web printing and postpress operations.

## 4 Multiple Plates Per Cylinder

In newspaper printing it is common to mount multiple plates to one cylinder. All plates of one cylinder together form a "logical plate". In practice, very often a single CIP3 PPF file is generated for each physical plate. In this scenario, a system which wants to merge all single CIP3 PPF files of a logical plate into one large CIP3 PPF file needs to know which physical plates belong to which logical plate.

In addition it also needs to know the position and orientation of each physical plate within the logical plate. This information, however, is currently not stored inside a CIP3 PPF file, but must be obtained from a different source.

There are two different types of newspapers: Broadsheet and Tabloid.

When producing a broadsheet newspaper, two types of plates can be used: broadsheet plates and panorama plates. A broadsheet plate can only contain one broadsheet page, while a panorama plate always contains two broadsheet pages. A panorama plate is often used for the inner pages of a newspaper, where one image covers two facing pages.

For the production of a tabloid newspaper, only broadsheet plates are used. In this case, two tabloid pages fit onto one broadsheet plate.

### 4.1 Specification

Two new attributes are defined for the Sheet structure to store the information about which plate is mounted where.

## 5 New Attributes

The following attributes are added to the CIP3 PPF Specification. Since they all are optional, compatibility with "standard" CIP3 PPF Version 3.0 files is not affected.

## 6 Implementation Guidelines

These implementation guidelines are intended as clarifications of some issues arising from the CIP3 Print Production Format (PPF) specification. If there are any conflicts between these notes and the specification, the specification itself takes priority and the comment here should be ignored (please notify CIP3 by mailing to Stefan Daun if you find any such conflicts).

### 6.1 What should the value of the CIP3AdmJobName key in a PPF file be?

The CIP3 PPF specification defines this field as a PostScript-style string, with no further restrictions. In many cases PPF readers pass the job name to other parts of a control system which have their own limitations on job name length or content. Under these circumstances the reader must apply its own mapping to convert the job name into a suitable format for that system. A reader which fails to read a valid PPF file because the job name is too long for its internal representation, or because it contains characters outside a restricted set does not conform to the CIP3 specification.

The content of the job name field, however, should be useful to the reading application. It is the responsibility of the workflow integrator ${ }^{1}$ to ensure that PPF writers create files which contain job names that are appropriate for the workflow and the reader or readers being used. To this end we recommend that both writers and readers be configurable to an extent that allows integrators to connect them in an efficient manner. We also recommend that PPF writers default to using the same content for the job name field in all PPF files created for the same job, and different content for different jobs.

### 6.2 What should the value of the CIP3AdmSheetName key in a PPF file be?

The CIP3 PPF specification defines this field as a PostScript-style string, with further restrictions on length and characters which may not be used in it. In many cases PPF readers derive information from the string and pass that data to other parts of a control system. If so, the reader must apply its own mapping to convert the data into a suitable format for that system. A reader which fails to read a valid PPF file because the sheet name does not match a specific format does not conform to the CIP3 specification.

The content of the sheet name field should, however, be useful to the reading application. It is the responsibility of the workflow integrator ${ }^{1}$ to ensure that PPF writers create files which contain sheet names that are appropriate for the workflow and the reader or readers being used. For instance, if a fully automatic reader needs to be able to derive the sheet number within a signature from each PPF file then that must be encoded in a way which will be understood by that reader. To this end we recommend that both writers and readers be configurable to an extent that allows integrators to connect them in an efficient manner. It may also be appropriate for a reader to reject PPF files which do not contain required information, but this should be done in a controlled manner which gives the operator enough information to understand the cause of the problem and, if possible and appropriate to the product, to enter the missing data manually.

### 6.3 Size of attributes of type String

Any software receiving CIP3 PPF files must not crash if the length of a string is bigger than it expects. When doing the mapping to a shorter string, at least the first 256 characters of the original string must be taken into account. In other words: String attribtues must be distinguished within the first 256 characters.

### 6.4 Do I need to include CIP3AdmPaperExtent etc. in a PPF file?

The CIP3 PPF specification clearly describes all of the Extent and Transform fields in the administration data section as optional, apart from CIP3AdmPSExtent, which must be present. The default values for missing fields are also clearly described. A PPF file reader which fails to read a valid PPF file because one or more of these optional fields is not included in the file does not conform to the CIP3 specification. It is, however, reasonable for a reader to reject files where the values for extents or transformations (whether included explicitly, or as default values) are inappropriate for the process of which the reader forms a part. If a file is rejected in this way it should be done in a controlled manner which gives the operator enough information to understand the cause of the problem and, if possible and appropriate to the product, to enter the missing data manually.

### 6.5 CIP3 PPF Version Number

An application writing CIP3 PPF files must write the lowest possible version number into the CIP3 PPF file so that it is compatible to a maximum of reading applications. Otherwise, reading applications may make their own attempt in interpreting the file.

## Notes:

1) The phrase 'Workflow integrator' is used here to denote the person or organization that is responsible for specification, installation and/or configuration of a workflow involving two or more products using PPF files.

## 7 Known Errors in CIP3 PPF Version 3.0

The following list of errors refers to version 3.0 of the CIP3 PPF Specification (dated June 2, 1998).

## Chapter 3.3.1.3 "Coordinate Systems" on page 31:

The variables $\boldsymbol{w}$ and $\boldsymbol{h}$ are exchanged by mistake in some of the matrices given in table 3-9. To correct this mistake, variable $\boldsymbol{w}$ has to be replaced by variable $\boldsymbol{h}$ and vice-versa. This applies to rows 2, 5,8 , and 9 . A corrected and improved version of the table is given in this document (see 2-2 "Matrices used to change the orientation" on page 14).

Chapter 3.3.2.7 "End Sheet Gluing" on page 49:
Table 3-21 shows the component specific dictionary for the EndSheetGluing operation (not for the Collecting operation).

Chapter 3.6 "Characteristic Curves for Transfer", Page 80:
The coordinate P4 given in Table 3-42 is wrong. The right values are: $\mathrm{In}=0.6$, Out $=0.525$.

## Chapter 3.7 "Register Marks", Page 82:

The word "job" at the end of the second sentence of the second paragraph should be replaced by the word "surface".

Chapter 3.8 "Color and Ink Control", page 84:
The DensityStandard attribute is of type Name (not of type String).

## Chapter 3.9 "Cutting Data", Pages 92+93:

The attribute name CIP3FoldingProcedure used in the code example on page 92 should be replaced by the attribute name CIP3BlockFoldingProcedure. The figure in the code example (especially for the attributes CIP3BlockSize, CIP3BlockElementSize, CIP3BlockSubDivision) do by mistake not match the cutting arrangement as given in illustration 3-27.

## Chapter 3.10 "Folding Data", Page 95:

The last sentence of the first paragraph should read: "Each procedure is stored under a unique name by which it can be referenced in the CutBlock structures."
