### Abstract

This CIP4 JDF Interoperability Conformance Specification (ICS) defines the interoperability requirements related to the communication between MIS and production equipment. It describes requirements that are generic for all stages of the production process (pre-press, press and post-press). It focuses on the main JDF structure, to way to submit JDF from an MIS to a Device and the way Devices communicate back to the MIS.

# 1 Introduction

The MIS plays a central role in a MIS-managed print shop. The MIS normally is the conduit between the print shop’s customers and the print shop’s production facilities (and sub-contractors). As a result, an MIS supports two major interfaces:

- One with the print shop’s customers – primarily JDF product Intent and specified in a separate *Product Description ICS*
- Another with the print shop’s production facilities – primarily JDF Process definitions. and specified in the **[MIS-ICS] (this document)**

JDF plays a major role in both interfaces.

**Note:** in this document, terms identified with ***bold-italics*** are defined in the *[Base-ICS]* if their definition does not appear immediately in this document.

Using *[Base-ICS]* terminology, the [MIS-ICS] specifies the generic parts of the ***Manager Interface*** (in an MIS) when it communicates with the ***Worker Interface*** (in production Workflow Components, such as Controllers and Devices). It also specifies the corresponding generic parts of the Worker Interface (in a Controller or Device) when it communicates with a Manager Interface (in an MIS).

This ICS includes:

- Specifications of JDF Elements that are not specific to either Prepress, Press or Postpress,
- **AuditPool** Elements for job costing and
- Specifications JMF Messages used for JobPartID synchronization, Job Tracking and Device utilization statistics.

Definitions that are specific to either Prepress, Press and Postpress are described in separate ICS documents.

This ICS describes the data flow in a print shop in a MIS-managed environment. However, this data flow does not necessarily also apply to non-MIS-managed environments.

## 1.1 Conformance Requirements

This ICS specifies three ***Conformance Levels*** of Conformance Requirements. These levels mainly differ in the type of communication between the ***Manager*** (in the MIS) and the ***Worker*** (in the controller or device)

### 1.1.1 Level 1

This subsection defines the conformance requirements for Level 1.

To be conformant to Level 1 of this ICS, a Manager (in an MIS) **MUST**

- Conform to Level 1 of the *[Base-ICS]* and

To be conformant to Level 1 of this ICS, a Worker (in a Controller or Device) **MUST**

- Conform to Level 1 of the *[Base-ICS]* and

### 1.1.2 Level 2

To be conformant to Level 2 of ICS, a Manager (in a MIS) **MUST**

- Conform to Level 2 of the *[Base-ICS]*,
- Conform to Level 1 of the *[MIS-ICS]*,
- Place conformant JMF Query Messages with Subscription elements in the ***JDF Instance*** and

To be conformant to Level 2 of this ICS a worker (in a controller or device) MUST

- Conform to Level 2 of the *[Base-ICS]*,
- Conform to Level 1 of the *[MIS-ICS]*,
- Be able to accept conformant JMF Query Messages with Subscription elements via the *JDF Instance*

### 1.1.3 Level 3

To be conformant to Level 3 of this ICS, a Manager (in a MIS) MUST

- Conform to Level 3 of the *[Base-ICS]*,
- Conform to Level 2 of the *[MIS-ICS]*,
- Be able to send conformant JMF Query and Command Messages to a Worker via HTTP,
- Be able to receive additional (to Level 2) conformant JMF Signal Messages and
- Be able to receive and execute conformant JMF Command Messages via HTTP,

To be conformant to Level 3 of this ICS, a Worker (in a Controller or Device) MUST

- Conform to Level 3 of the *[Base-ICS]*,
- Conform to Level 2 of the *[MIS-ICS]*,
- Be able to send out conformant JMF Command Messages and additional (to Level 2) conformant Signal Messages,
- Be able to receive and execute conformant JMF Query and Command Messages from the Manager via HTTP and
- Be able to return the JDF Instance to the Manager (in the MIS) via HTTP.

## 1.2 Terminology

This section defines terminology used throughout this document. References to other documents are indicated with square brackets, e.g. [JDF1.2]. For most terms, see the Terminology section in [Base-ICS].

This section contains MIS-related terms that pertain to this ICS:

**Gray Box** – A Process Group node with a non-empty *Types* Attribute and no child Nodes. Each Gray Box specifies a loose combination of several processes with a specific goal. The *Types* Attribute identifies the processes. Usually, a Manager creates a Gray Box and a Worker expands it by replacing each value (or set of values) of the *Types* Attribute with a corresponding child Node for a Process or Gray Box. See [MIS-Pre-ICS] for more details.

## 1.3 JDF Instances

This ICS specifies the JDF Elements that are not specific to either prepress, press or postpress. These Elements include the JDF Root Node and a number of Elements close to the root, like *CustomerInfo*. The ICS also includes guidelines (rules) on the use of certain Attributes in these and other Elements.

## 1.4 Gray Boxes

A Gray Box specifies a loose combination of several processes with a specific goal. A Gray Box does not specify all processes or all resources – except for output resources.

When an MIS (acting as a Manager) uses Gray Boxes, it specifies only the Processes and Resources that are of real interest to the MIS, that is, everything it needs to track the produced output resources. When a Worker receives a Gray Box, it fills in the details. See [MIS-Pre-ICS] for examples of Gray Boxes.

[JDF 1.2] introduces the Process Group with a *Types* Attribute to allow the MIS to specify large modules (like Prepress) with incompletely specified Processes and Resources. By contrast, a Combined Process requires that all of its Processes and Resources be specified

In a JDF Instance, a Process Group with a *Types* Attribute and no child nodes represents a Gray Box.

For more details, see:

- Section 3.1.4.1 "Use of the Types Attribute in ProcessGroup nodes" of [JDF1.2].
- The Types Attribute in table 3-4 "Contents of a JDF node" of [JDF1.2].

**Note:** Gray boxes MUST NOT be spawned by Partition. See [JDF] 4.4.3.

## 1.5 JMF Messages

This ICS describes how JMF Messages are used to

- Provide information about Device utilization and Job progress,
- Provide information about costs from a Worker in a production Controller or Device to a Manager in an MIS and
- Facilitate creation of new JDF Instances and synchronize JobPartIDs.

This ICS describes the conformance requirements for

- Command Messages for **NewJDF**
- Response Messages and Acknowledge Messages for **NewJDF**
- Query Messages with Subscription Element to create a Persistent Channel for **NewJDF**, **Status** and **Resource**.
- Signal Messages for **NewJDF**, **Status** and **Resource**.
- Command Message for **StopPersistentChannel**.

Other JMF messages are possible (e.g. Resource update messages) but these are outside the scope of this ICS.

This ICS describes both the JMF Message formats and the transfer protocol. This ICS describes the HTTP transfer protocol for JMF messages. In order to be conformant to Levels 2 and 3 of this ICS both the Manager and the Worker MUST support the HTTP protocol.

## 2 Conformance Tables – JDF Instances

See Appendix A “How to Read ICS Documents” in [Base-ICS] for an explanation of the table format and the codes used to specify conformance

This section specifies conformance requirements for a JDF Instance. When Manager (in a MIS) submits a JDF Instance to a Worker (in a controller or device), they all MUST conform to these conformance requirements. When a Worker returns a JDF Instance to a Manager, they all MUST conform to these conformance requirements.

### 2.1 JDF Node

Table 1 specifies the Attributes and Elements for a JDF Node, whether it is a Root Node or a Sub-node. Some Attributes and Elements are specified only for a Root Node and are so noted in the first line of the Description.

## 2.3 Component – Output

Each Product Node’s ResourceLinkPool MUST contain at least one output ComponentLink (which, of course, links to a **Component**). To put it more succinctly, each Product Node MUST link to at least one output **Component**. If a root Product Node links to an output **Component**, the **Component** is the final product. If any other Product Node links to an output **Component**, the **Component** is a partial product. Table 11 shows the conformance requirements for such output **Components**.

## 2.5 JDF Instance – Worker Updated

### 2.5.1 AuditPool – Created or Updated

When a Worker returns a JDF Instance to its Manager, the Worker MUST return the same JDF Instance that it received from the Manager except for certain parts of the JDF Instance that a Worker MAY modify. In particular, the Worker MUST add information into the AuditPool of the JDF Root Node and each Process node that was executed (See Table 13: JDF Node – Returned). The Worker MUST NOT return a portion of the JDF Instance that it received from the Manager.

## 4 Job Submission

In the normal case, the MIS creates a Print Job and submits it to the production Device. In some cases, a production Device, such as a prepress Device, creates a Print Job. In this case, the Customer submits a content file for a Job that the MIS has not yet created. In other cases, the Device splits an existing Job into different production Jobs. In these cases where the MIS doesn’t initially create a job, the **Device Worker** (the Worker part of a Device – see the Terminology section of [JDF 1.2]) **MUST** ask the **MIS Manager** to create a Job and submit it to the Device Worker.

### 4.1 JDF Instance Structure

JDF Instances consist of Product, Process Group, and Process Nodes. A Product Node describes the final product the Customer will receive. The JDF Product Intent Resources define the characteristics of this final product.

JDF Product Nodes **MUST** contain Product Intent Resources. In other words, if the Intent cannot be described or is not available, the Root Node of the JDF Instance **MUST** be a Process or a Process Group. Product Intent Resources **MUST** only describe product characteristics that the Customer supplies. Product Intent resources **MUST** describe the Customer’s view of a job. Intent Resources **MUST NOT** describe details of the production process of which the Customer has no knowledge (e.g. the individual printed sheets that make up the text of a brochure).

### 4.2 JDF Creation / Job(Part)ID assignment

In a MIS managed environment, only the MIS can assign *JobIDs*. Sometimes, a Device requires a new *JobID* – for example, because a pre-press manager initiates the job. If so, the Device needs to ask the MIS for a new *JobID*. Table 22 defines the **NewJDF** Command Message that the Device Worker **MUST** use to ask the MIS Manager for a new *JobID*. In order to conform to Level 3 of this ICS, a Manager and Worker **MUST** support the **NewJDF** Command. If a **NewJDF** Command generates a completely new *JobID*, the **NewJDF** Command does not cause a job to be submitted to a Device. Therefore, the MIS Manager **MUST** perform a **SubmitQueueEntry** Command in order to submit this Job with the new *JobID* to the Device.

If a Device creates a new Node while it is expanding a "Gray Box", the Device MUST assign the *JobPartID*. See the *JobPartID* Attribute in the JDF Node table in *[Base-ICS]* for details on the algorithm for generating a *JobPartID*. To be compliant to Level 2 of this ICS, the Worker MUST, upon creating a new Node (and new *JobPartID*), send a NewJDF Signal to the Manager indicating this event if the Manager has created a Subscription for NewJDF. See Table 28: Signal – NewJDF. To be compliant with Level 3 of this ICS the Worker MUST also support the NewJDF Query so that the Manager can retrieve information about a an unknown Node for which it receives Signals. .See Table 41: Query – NewJDF. See the companion *[MIS-AN]* for more details.

## 5 JMF Messages

### 5.1 Goals

Within the scope of this ICS, the description is limited to the use of JMF Messages for the following main goals:

1. Job Tracking
2. Job Costing (limited)
3. Device monitoring and (utilization) analysis
4. Material consumption

See the companion *[MIS-AN]* for more details.

#### 5.1.1 Job Tracking

The MIS has to generate the Job tracking information from the combination of the Attribute values in the *DeviceInfo* and *JobPhase* Elements. The companion *[MIS-AN]* shows a state transition diagram with the various state transitions that a Device can undergo with the appropriate settings for the *DeviceInfo* and *JobPhase* Attributes.

#### 5.1.2 Job Costing

The MIS MAY generate the Job costing information from the combination of the Attribute values in the *DeviceInfo* and *JobPhase* Elements. However, there is no guarantee that the MIS will be provided with a complete set of messages. The communication between a Device and the MIS may be down for a period of time, for whatever reason. In such a situation, a Device MAY retry sending the messages.

Therefore, after a Device has completed a Job and returned the JDF Instance to the MIS, the MIS MAY interpret the *AuditPool* information in the JDF Instance to either create or update/modify the costing information that was gathered from previous JMF messages. The MIS may use business rules to limit updates and/or modifications to costing information.

#### 5.1.3 Device Monitoring and Analysis

The MIS must generate the Device monitoring and analysis information from a combination of the Attribute values in the *DeviceInfo* and *JobPhase* Elements. The companion *[MIS-AN]* describes how to generate this information when a Device is executing a job and when a Device is not executing a job (i.e., non-productive mode).

Because non-productive time is not related any particular production job, non-productive time will not appear in the *AuditPool* information of any JDF Instances returned to the MIS. Therefore the MIS has to rely solely of the information retrieved from JMF Messages to create complete Device monitoring and analysis information.

#### 5.1.4 Resource Consumption

A Device that, during the execution of a Node, consumes Resources of Class *Consumable* MUST notify the MIS by sending a JMF Signal *Resource* Message. See Table 38: Signal – Resource5.3.1 Persistent Channels).

## 5.2 When to send a Status Signal

A Device **MUST** send a JMF Status Signal to the MIS each time one of the Attributes of the previous Signal has changed, (see section 5.3.1 Persistent Channels).. These changes include (but are not limited to) a change in the:

- Status of a job,
- Part of the job that is being produced (either identified by *JobPartID* or potentially by Partition Key),
- Employee(s) operating the Device,
- Shift of the Employee(s) operating the Device,

If a Device sends Status Signals in response to a Subscription, the Device **MUST** honor the *RepeatTime* Attribute. See section 5.3.1 of this ICS for details for Subscriptions. It is up to the MIS to decide how to handle Status Signals that do not indicate a change in Status and/or Job. The MIS **MAY** merge the data from the intermediate Signals or ignore them all together.

The Status Signal indicates to the MIS the moment in time when a transition takes place, like the indication of the start of a new status. Please note that the *JobPhase/@PhaseAmount* and *JobPhase/@PhaseWaste* Attributes indicate the amount produced since the start of the Phase. Special attention is required for the transition between a JobPhase with production Amounts to a JobPhase without productions Amounts, such as from “Running” to “Stopped”. For these transitions the Device **MUST** generate two Status Signals. The first one is a copy of the previous Signal, except for the values of *JobPhase/@PhaseAmount* and *JobPhase/@PhaseWaste*. In the second one, the Attributes are updated to show the new status of the Device. This will give MIS immediate feedback about the produced amounts in the closed Phase. See the companion [MIS-AN] for an example of a sequence of events.

### 5.2.1.1 Financial Period Costing / Analysis

The MIS cannot solely rely on the JMF Status Signals to produce complete and accurate costing of a job, but it has the requirement to provide (nearly) real-time costing and work-in-progress (WIP) information. Therefore, a Device **MUST** send, via a Status Signal, a “snapshot” JDF Instance with a *AuditPool*, at least once every 3 hour (for jobs that run for more than 3 hour). The *AuditPool* **MUST** be complete up to and including the current *PhaseTime*, however the current *PhaseTime* **NEED NOT** be complete and **MAY** continue after the snapshot. In other words, the *PhaseTime/@End* in the node's final *AuditPool* **MAY** be different from the *PhaseTime/@End* in the snapshot. See section 5.3.1 of this ICS for details. See Table 14 for details of the required *AuditPool* Element.

## 5.3 Subscriptions

### 5.3.1 Persistent Channels

To be compliant to Level 2 of this ICS Manager and Worker **MUST** be able to create a Persistent Channel via JMF Query Messages placed in the JDF Instance's */JDF/NodeInfo/JMF*. To be compliant to Level 3 of this ICS, the Manager and Worker **MUST** be able to create a Persistent Channel via stand-alone JMF Query Messages via HTTP. A Level 3 Worker **MUST** support the *StopPersistentChannel* Message.

If a Level 2 Device does not implement an HTTP-server, the MIS **MUST** interpret repeated connection failures to indicate that the Device does not support JMF Messages via HTTP. If the Device implements an HTTP-server, but does not support JMF Messages, the Device **MUST** return a Response with *@ReturnCode* = 111 (Subscription request denied).

To be conformant to Level 3 of this ICS, the MIS **MUST** be able to send JMF Messages via HTTP and **MAY** be able to send Query Messages with Subscriptions via the *JDF/NodeInfo/JMF* Element. A Level 3 Device **MUST** be able to accept JMF Messages via HTTP and **MUST** be able to accept Query Messages with Subscriptions via the *JDF/NodeInfo/JMF* Element.

## 5.4 Transmission Protocol

Although the JDF 1.2 Specification allows the use of Hot Folders for JMF messaging, this ICS does not. HTTP MUST be used as the transmission protocol for JMF messages.

# 6 Returning JDF for completed Jobs

In a complete JDF workflow, the Manager that submits a JDF Instance to a queue will get back the JDF Instance when the processing of the JDF Instance on the Device has completed. The returned JDF Instance MUST contain information generated by the production Device. This information consists of

- AuditPool Element about the actual processing at the Device,
- Resource update information (for example quantities produced)
- Information required by subsequent Processes (for example Preview resources).

The MIS can use this information to update the status of the Job and to provide updated resource information to the next production Process for the job.

## 6.1 AuditPool in JDFs Returned to the MIS

The MIS MAY generate the Job costing information from the combination of the Attribute values in the DeviceInfo and JobPhase Elements of JMF Status Signals. However, there is no guarantee that the Device will provide the MIS with a complete set of Messages. For example, the communication between a Device and the MIS may be down for a period of time, for whatever reason. Therefore, the Device MUST write a complete AuditPool as defined in section 2.5.1 of this ICS.

The MIS MAY interpret the AuditPool information in the JDF either to create the costing information or to update/modify the costing information that the MIS gathered from JMF messages

### 6.1.1 When to Close Audits

The Device MUST close an Audit (PhaseTime and ProcessRun) and start a new one each time one of the Attributes of the previous Audit has changed. These changes include (but are not limited to) a change in the:

- Status of a job,
- Part of the job that is being produced (either identified by *JobPartID* or by Partition Key),
- Employee(s) operating the Device,
- Shift of the Employee(s) operating the Device.
